

Gavin Maynard tells of experience with food allergies

The second week of May is Food Allergy Awareness Week in the U.S. Over 32 million Americans suffer from food allergies. According to Food Allergy Research and Education, every three minutes, a food allergy reaction sends someone to the emergency room.

One of the 32 million is Gavin Maynard, a sophomore at Canby High School. Maynard's allergies became apparent at a young age after he broke out in hives from ingesting peanut butter. After visiting an allergist, Maynard was found to be allergic to peanuts and tree nuts. Maynard has an EpiPen on him at all times but thankfully has not had to use it.

While some food allergies, like to milk or eggs, can be outgrown, allergies to peanuts and tree nuts are usually lifelong, which means Maynard will be dealing with this allergy for his lifetime. Maynard remembers his parents helping him figure out what foods were and were not safe for him to eat when he was younger, but he is now a pro at knowing what to avoid and makes sure to check labels of any new foods.

While it may have bothered him in his younger years to not be able to partake in the same foods and snacks as his peers, he says, "I just got used to it." With Mother's Day just be-



hind us, it is important to understand how food allergies in young children affect their mothers as well. Mothers with children under the age of five are found to have higher blood pressure and significantly greater levels of psychosocial stress. Parents of children with food allergies are found to avoid restaurants and restrict social activities and travel.

Researchers don't know why, but food allergies are on the rise in the U.S. Use this week to educate yourself on common food allergies as well as what you can do to help raise awareness for food allergies. For more information, visit www.foodallergyawareness.org.

City council approves airport hanger project

During their May 5 meeting, the Canby City Council approved an airport hangar project as well as a public hearing for police body cams.

Matt Wagner spoke to the council about recommendations regarding the new hangar and humidity issues they have been having at the airport.

Wagner started by giving a brief overview of how the airport works and explained how funding is utilized. Over the past 15 years, the airport has

used the \$150,000 a year in federal funds to put in a fuel system, buy a bidirectional loader, improve pavement, and build a new hangar. The main revenue source for the airport comes from hangar rent, hangar leases, land leases, and fuel sales. As a public use airport, Canby does not collect any landing fees.

Around three years ago, the airport used their federal funding, both forward and back, to complete the new hangar project. The new hangar cost

School board approves security improvements, discusses goals

The Canby School Board approved school security improvements and discussed goals during their May 3, meeting.

Superintendent Ryan Nielsen said it has been several years since security improvements were made, and the safe schools budget has grown to almost \$100,000. Areas he would like to see cameras added include the hallways outside the bathrooms on the second and third floors, the north side of the gym, the alley

way, the bus loading zone, and the cafeteria at the high school as well as the north side of the elementary school.

Updating the door software which programs the locks and key fobs is another option, though it could wait until later.

The board approved the security improvements.

Hiring a summer strength and conditioning coach was approved. He is a Southwest Minnesota State University student who interned last year in the position and would like to come back again.

The position will be four hours each day, four days a week at \$17.50 an hour. This will give students a window of opportunity to come work out during the summer.

Board member Kari Hardig asked whether this is a position that could be kept during the school year, and Nielsen responded that it's a possibility.

Nielsen reported that breakfast and lunch will be free again next year for all students. Refunds for existing balances will be given upon request.

The junior high concert is Tuesday, May 11. Graduation

practice is May 14 at 2 p.m. with graduation on May 21 at 7 p.m. High school Principal Dr. Robert Slaba said that names were randomly drawn for which graduate would have what table. He reiterated that those seated at a graduate's table should plan to arrive together.

Preschool graduation will be May 12 for Little Lancers and May 13 for Little Lancers Plus. The Little Learner breakfast will be May 13 as well. The Little Lancers Plus class will be coming back for two weeks at the end of the school year due to being quarantined. Their last day will be May 27.

The elementary spring program will be May 17. There will be three concerts about 20-25 minutes long each and spaced out with K-1 at 6 p.m., 2-3 at 6:45 p.m., and 4-6 at 7:30 p.m. They will be held at the high school to have more room to space people out.

It is really surreal to be looking at the end of a journey that, when it began, felt like it would be so long.

My husband graduates this week, having completed the med fire rescue program at Lake Area Tech. He is now a paramedic and a firefighter and is looking for a job that will, ideally, incorporate both, and we'll be off on a whole new journey.

Two years ago, when we truly began to realize that farming was not our future after all, there were a lot of questions about what came next. Many options were discussed. How much he had enjoyed the tactical trauma response course he had taken and his trip to Texas to serve with Samaritan's Purse earlier that year was always in the back of our minds.

And then, one day, it just seemed to fall into place, and he decided on the med fire rescue program. I honestly had never thought of him as a paramedic, or any other medical-related job, mostly due to all the technical reading required. He was always more a hands-on learner than a reader.

He got accepted to school, and after a couple weeks of him driving back and forth, we started looking for a place to live in Watertown. For someone who had never signed a lease that couldn't be gotten out of with 30 days notice, the idea of nearly a year commitment was terrifying. I vividly remember sitting on the floor of the empty living room of our home, looking at lease papers with an end date 10.5 months away (they wanted to get the dates in line with the school year). I was thinking that it was so far away; how could we possibly know that we would want to stay that long?

When we renewed the lease that next summer, for a whole year this time, I kind of had the same feelings again. And then, just this month, when we said we would not be renewing our lease, that was almost as scary as signing it in the first place.

More than 18 months after starting school and moving, we're looking at moving again in the next few months, and while I once felt that it would be such a long time, now I can't believe it's come upon us so quickly.

I don't know where we will end up or when. I only know that come Aug. 1, we have to be somewhere else.

Five years ago, when I believed I was living in a house on a farm where I would live for the rest of my life, the idea of not knowing where I would be or what I would be doing in three months would have been terrifying.

Now, somehow, it's almost as exciting as it is scary. Maybe I've gotten used to living with that uncertainty. Maybe I've broken free of the continuity of farm life - even though nearly nothing went as expected, you always at least knew where you would be and what you would be doing.

Never before did we have options. We were always tied to the seasons, tied to a piece of ground, tied to caring for the animals. Even vacations were limited. And to be honest, we didn't really mind. We loved what we did.

And even though every new step of our new journey is scary in its own way, there's also an excitement to be found in possibility, in knowing that we have options.

I guess the point in all that rambling is to try not to be afraid of making big decisions, big changes that will alter the trajectory of your life. Don't be afraid of switching careers or going back to school or doing whatever is necessary to get you to where you're supposed to be in life, even if it is somewhere you never ever pictured yourself.

The same amount of time will pass whether you're pursuing something new or stuck somewhere you don't want to be, so don't use lack of time as an excuse.

Be open. Be willing to learn. Be brave.

Or as a quote on my computer says, "Do it scared!"

Minnesota's COVID restrictions to loosen in three-phase plan

Minnesota Governor Tim Walz announced a three-phase loosening of COVID restrictions last Thursday, with the first phase already in effect and coming phases to begin May 28 and July 1.

As of May 7, limits for outdoor dining, events, and get-togethers are removed as is the mask requirement outdoors, except at large venues of more than 500 people. Additionally, masks are not required at outdoor events without a controlled perimeter, such as a parade or fireworks display. Also ended is the 11 p.m. mandatory closing time for bars, restaurants, and other

businesses serving food and drink. The capacity for indoor areas is capped at 75% of the maximum occupancy, and no more than 10 customers may be seated together.

On May 28, the remaining capacity and distancing limits will end for indoor events and gatherings. These limits have been in place since the very first stay at home order in mid-March of 2020. The only requirements remaining will be the mask mandate for indoors as well as outdoor events of more than 500 people.

July 1 will bring an end to the statewide mask mandate as well as the requirement for businesses to have COVID pre-

paredness plans. Local governments/cities or private businesses can implement their own mandates if they wish.

Walz stated that the mask mandate may end sooner if 70% of Minnesota's adults have received their COVID shots.

The Safe Learning Plan for schools will continue through the end of the school year, and the eviction moratorium, ban on price gouging, and eligibility exemptions for state services will remain in place.


There was no mention of Walz's intention regarding his emergency powers.

It is now recommended to add exhaust fans with a humidistat switch which would allow the fans to operate when the humidity goes above the set level. Wagner used a hypothetical situation that if these fans ran for three months straight, it would cost \$4.60 per month per unit on average. Council members liked the idea of the exhaust fans.

Wagner reminded the council that the bids for both the de-humidifiers and the exhaust fans came out at around \$30,000. The bid from Anhalt Plumbing and Rangaard Electric for \$29,335 for the exhaust fans was approved.

Chief of Police Eric Diekmann addressed the proposed body-worn cameras the council had previously discussed. Diekmann started with the proposed body-worn camera policy. The policy allows more officer discrepancy as to when the body cameras will be used. Diekmann went on to use the example of an officer anticipating something that might be of evidentiary value versus any public interaction an officer were to have on the street. The policy also includes information on data privacy and safeguards.

First Security Bank donated \$15,666 for the three body cameras. "I cannot thank them enough," said Diekmann. The \$15,666 is based off the three body camera Axon system. Diekmann does have a meeting with Watchguard next week where they will be presenting quotes for a three body camera system and also for a three body camera system plus two in car. This will help guide the decision of how to proceed. Diekmann will have a final

number to present by the next council meeting.

The council also approved the public hearing for the body camera policy for June 1.

Terry Gaalswyk, president of Minnesota West, updated the council on how the school has fared this past year with COVID. Enrollment was down 7.4% collectively across the institution, which is similar to the decline in the system as a whole. The primary decline in enrollment stemmed from two areas, one being student athletes, which mainly affected the Worthington campus, and the second being the nursing program and allied health programs. Many of these students work in long term care facilities and clinics and were needed in the field last year. On the Canby campus, the electrical program was strong while the diesel and dental programs were both down.

Fall enrollment is looking up. Electrical is already full for next year, which is attributed to the remodel of the program's space last year. There are plans to update the diesel tech space this summer as well as the restrooms on campus. Minnesota West has been working diligently to make sure classes can be in-person next fall. "It's hard to learn how to run a bead through simulation," Gaalswyk said.

Due to the enrollment decline, Minnesota West will be offering a Free Bird scholarship. Students can come take a three-credit class over the summer months for free. Gaalswyk wants to ensure that "The talent here in southwest Minnesota engages with the institution" and then stays within the area. Minnesota West has

also been using stimulus dollars to help in student aid due to financial stress this past year.

Lastly, Gaalswyk spoke of the farm business management program. Thirteen facility members across southwest Minnesota work with over 500 producers in regards to their operations. "They help them understand their business operations ... their inputs, their outputs, their marketing strategies and everything else to be profitable, and they are able to provide evidence back to the producer in regards to how they are performing relative to their peers," explained Gaalswyk. Five more faculty members have been added to the Minnesota West program which enhances their reach in the northern parts of their service area. They will now be able to work with about 650 producers in the region.

Sheila Khruse, of Bolton and Menk, updated the city on the ongoing infrastructure project. At the time of the meeting, Khruse had a list of 111 yards that she found unacceptable in regards to the reseeding of grass in yards and boulevards. If the company does not rectify the situation by the first of June, Canby will be searching for a new landscaper.

She also requested a final

payment to Pennings Construction for their work on the tennis court, which was approved.


Deb Lanthier gave the annual library report. Last year, the library was closed for 14 weeks. Once reopened, the library followed COVID protocols by limiting the number of people inside at one time, asking patrons to social distance, and requiring masks upon entry. Computer use is limited to two patrons at a time with a one hour limit. Computer usage was down from 8,000 to 923. The library also saw a 10,000 person decline in in-person visits, but 1,085 patrons opted for curbside delivery. The library plans to continue this offer and will also continue to offer their take and make kits, live and virtual programs, and are once again delivering books to assisted living. They also have Mobile Signs on the Go coming for a Hat Days sign making activity.

The Tesch family asked to end their theater lease agreement with the city. The council motioned to terminate the old theater lease and approved the new lease for Lessor and Ferguson Entertainment.

The next council meeting will be held on May 19 at 6 p.m.

70 Years Ago - May 11, 1951

"Girls took top honors with scholastic standings so close that it was necessary to name co-vedictors and a salutatorian who ranked only decimal points behind them ... The co-vedictors are Carol Millard, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Phil Millard, and Marilyn Maier, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Maier, both of Canby. The girls had an average of 96 plus. With an average of 96, Vivian Johnson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Guy Johnson who farm near Gary, S.D., is the salutatorian."

"Dr. D. T. Nelson, who was graduated from the Northwestern College of Chiropractic in Minneapolis last March, will open an office in the Fieder building Monday, May 21, he announced Tuesday. He has rented the two corner rooms formerly occupied by Samuel Lewison and the Rev. Elra Key and will share the waiting room with Mr. Lewison who has moved to an adjoining office. In addition to standard chiropractic equipment, the office will also have an x-ray machine."

"Miss Mabel Svoboda purchased the Broadway Cafe in Canby from Mr. and Mrs. J. P. Hansen in a business transaction completed Monday evening. Miss Svoboda, who is a native of Canby, is experienced in the restaurant business having previously been employed in local cafes and she worked in Marshall until this week."

"New officers were elected and six new members were initiated at the meeting of the American Legion Auxiliary Wednesday night of last week. Mrs. A. Marvin Anderson was elected president; Mrs. Newell Amundson, first vice president; Mrs. Oscar Bockes, second vice president; Mrs. Harold Mueller, treasurer; and Mrs. Elmer Gylling, sergeant-at-arms."

50 Years Ago - May 13, 1971

"New postage rates become effective next Sunday, May 16. The cost of mailing a letter will advance to 8¢ per ounce ... The rate for postal and post cards is increased to 6 cents each."

"Burton Elliot is now stationed in Canby and is a deputy sheriff for Yellow Medicine County ... Elliot, who has had many years in law enforcement, has served with the Minnesota Highway Patrol stationed in the Morris District and served as chief of police in Granite Falls."

"Voters in the Canby School District 891 will go to the polls Tuesday, May 18, and elect two board members from the slate of five on the ballot. The five persons who filed are: Mrs. Joan (Jody) Olson, Mrs. Roger Zimmerman, Mrs. Willis Beecher, Hugo Hillman and Lester Briggs."

25 Years Ago - May 15, 1996

"The chancellor of Minnesota State Colleges and Universities turned down Canby's request to split the Canby Campus of Southwestern Technical College away from STC ... the plan to split Canby away was proposed as an alternative to current plans that have so far removed the campus president, dean of students and campus student recruiter. A change in status from a campus to a learning center has been offered. The plan was developed through the efforts of the faculty and staff and was sent to Eaton."

"The Canby City Council indicated it was ready to do anything it could to assure a future for the Canby campus of Southwestern Technical College. The city's John Meyer said the plan being pursued was to break off from STC and to become an independent institution ... Meyer said no one has said straight out what the school's future will be if nothing is done, other than it would become a 'center' instead of a fully functioning campus."

"What's the Canby Campus of Southwestern Technical College worth to the Canby Public Schools? 'If they closed down tomorrow, we could lose up to 50 kids - that's \$250,000 gone along with some jobs,' said Superintendent Marv Nieden during a meeting of the Canby School Board."

"It's called 'TechSmart' and the Diesel Fuel Injection program at Southwestern Technical College's Canby campus is one of just 10 training sites selected to participate ... TechSmart will provide scholarships for students as well as training opportunities for instructors, according to Pete Girard, head of STC's diesel fuel courses."

5 Years Ago - May 11, 2016

"With 19 in attendance at their May 3 meeting, the Canby City Council decided to have a committee formed and a traffic engineer do a study to come up with a revised stop sign policy for the city."

"After a planning commission meeting held prior to the Canby City Council's May 3 meeting, the council approved to introduce an ordinance to rezone the property owned by Brent Merritt and Helena from Industrial A to Commercial A. This is for the corner of Highway 68 and Haarfager Ave. South that was once owned by Helena. Merritt wishes to build on the property but needs the property reclassified to commercial from industrial."



Ask a TROOPER

Question: If a person has a medical exception to a specified window tint level (per medical prescription by medical provider), do you have to register that exception/prescription with the state? Or register the car that has the applied tint?

Answer: It is not necessary to notify the Department of Public Safety Driver Vehicle Services (DPS-DVS) in Minnesota. DVS doesn't place window tint/medical restriction on the driver's license or on the vehicle's registration. Drivers will need to have a prescription or proof from their doctor regarding the medical need to have tinted windows below the 50 percent light transmittance plus or minus 3 percent.

The proper document will need to be in the vehicle to show law enforcement upon request. The document will need to specifically state the minimum percentage that light transmittance may be reduced to satisfy the prescription or medical needs of the patient; and the prescription or statement contains an expiration date, which must be no more than two years after the date the prescription or statement was issued.

If the window tint is below the state minimum of 50 percent light transmittance, that vehicle may be stopped by law enforcement, as the officer will not be aware of the medical exemption.

In Minnesota, you can have your windows tinted to a light transmittance of 50 percent, but not less. Light transmittance is the amount of light that is required to pass through both the window and the tint film. Before any tint material is applied to your windows, a vehicle comes from the factory with tint already inside the glass material. No window comes from the factory at 100 percent light transmittance. My experience has been that most vehicles are already at 75 percent before any modifications.

- No vehicle can have ANY tint to the front windshield.

- Passenger cars are limited to 50 percent on all side and rear windows.

- Pickups, vans, and SUVs are limited to 50 percent on the front side windows.

- Pickups, vans, and SUVs are not limited on the rear side and rear windows. (Can be less than 50 percent behind the front seat).

- Squad cars, limousines, and vehicles used to transport human remains by a funeral establishment are not limited on the side and rear windows.

Troopers have window tint meters in their patrol cars and will test the windows for the legal percent of light transmittance if they look to be below the statutory limit. If they are found below the legal limit, the driver may be issued a citation.

You can avoid a ticket — and a crash — if you simply buckle up, drive at safe speeds, pay attention and always drive sober. Help us drive Minnesota Toward Zero Deaths.

Dear Neighbor,

With adjournment from the 2021 session looming, House Democrats' should abandon their push to raise taxes by billions of dollars amid a historic state surplus.

The House Democrats' proposed tax increases are completely unnecessary and could threaten our ability to agree on a new state budget before the May 17 deadline for adjournment. It is disappointing to see such a partisan budget with tax hikes on gasoline, license tabs, Main Street businesses, and middle-class Minnesotans in general.

These provisions have no chance of passing the Senate, where every budget bill in that body has earned bipartisan support and tax increases are absent. I would rather see the new two-year state budget focus on helping Minnesota families and businesses regain their footing after a year of pandemic-related setbacks.

With a \$1.6 billion state surplus and \$2.6 billion more in federal money coming to our state, we can find common ground on a responsible, bipartisan budget that funds our priorities without raising taxes.

The state has an overabundance of revenue, while many people have faced great financial strain over the last year. It's hard to imagine a worse time to raise taxes. House Democrats should get in touch with the world we're living in and set their tax increases aside so we can negotiate a bipartisan budget and get our work done on time. That's what Minnesotans expect and deserve.

I also hope Gov. Tim Walz does not use his emergency

powers as an end-of-session bargaining chip that could complicate end-of-session negotiations. Emergency powers are meant to be used for emergencies, not for political leverage that could make a budget solution even more difficult to achieve.

At this point, any need for quick decisions from the executive branch has long passed. The governor is even talking about the State Fair looking pretty close to normal this summer. If that doesn't tell him it's time to let the emergency powers go, I don't know if anything will. We owe Minnesotans a transparent and concrete process for ending Minnesota's peacetime emergency that has been in place for more than one year.

House Republicans have voted nearly 20 times to end the peacetime emergency and have put forward numerous proposals to end or modify the governor's chapter 12 powers, as well as proposals to establish timelines and metrics that would end the peacetime emergency. Democrats have refused to advance those proposals in the House and have even held off proposals from their own party to wind down the governor's emergency powers.







Winners chosen in patriotic art, illustrating America contests



School board continued from page 1

Nielsen recommended approving hiring a full-time special education teacher, as was discussed as the board's previous meeting. The board approved adding the position.

The board approved the resignation of Gina Zaske.

The PACT for Families collaborative social worker contract for Brian Skogen was approved at Nielsen's recommendation. This comes at a cost of a little under \$65,000. The contract is exactly the same as it's always been.

The budget for the summer academy has been approved, and curriculum has been ordered. More information about that is being sent out.

Nielsen presented a design for the gym floor to the board and asked for their opinions. It is all stain, not paint, except for the mascot in the middle. It was commented that the floors of the gyms for the NCAA tournament were stained.

Insurance will not cover the water damage to the brick at the high school, but the school will proceed with repairing the falling brick before the roof project gets to that area of the school.

Board member Angela Lepke questioned the snow day that was forgiven during the last meeting. It was the day before Christmas and was planned to be a half day. She asked whether it was also forgiven for staff or if there was a day planned for them to make it up.

Nielsen responded that the staff will need to make up the day, but it will be left up to the staff to get it done however it works for them. The school isn't specifying a day that they must come in.

To end the meeting, the board spent an hour discussing goal setting for the upcoming school year and beyond.

Board member Jaci Weber mentioned that she would like to see more career and technical education (CTE) classes, listing building and first responder training as examples.

It was mentioned that CTE classes depend on what the current teachers are able to teach.

A lack of business classes was mentioned, and options were discussed for more classes that could be held in that area.

Slaba spoke about options for classes and how scheduling works, stating that most students will try to get their classes in the morning and free up their seventh and eighth periods; therefore, a class offered only eighth period, for example, will usually have fewer students than a similar class first period.

Slaba also said that classes for 7-10th grades are pretty generic, and in their junior and senior years, students get more choice.

It was said that teachers are passionate in different areas, and when they show their passion, the students flock to their classes.

Weber asked whether equal opportunities were available for students heading to a two year school after graduation versus a four year school.

Slaba admitted that there may be a bit of a lack for two year students and added that the percentage of graduates going to two year schools has increased greatly in recent years.

Slaba also handed out a list of all classes students can choose from, though he stated that they don't run unless enough students sign up for them, so most don't run on a regular basis.

Many more desires for the programming for the school were discussed, and Harding mentioned that they should have a bit of a goal setting time on a regular basis versus only once a year. Goal setting will henceforth be on the agenda for the first meeting of each month.

The next meeting of the Canby School Board will be Monday, May 17, at 5:30 p.m.

Do not touch or move deer fawns

With deer fawns starting to be born, the DNR asks that people avoid disturbing or touching them.

Most fawns are born from mid-May to mid-June, and they do not attempt to evade predators during their first few weeks of life. Instead, they remain still to avoid being seen. During these times, fawns are learning critical survival skills from

their mothers but are often left on their own while their mothers forage nearby.

Be assured, deer fawns do fine even if they look abandoned or fragile. Even if a fawn is wounded or abandoned as a result of car strike or animal attack, people should not transport it before speaking with a wildlife rehabilitator.

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



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
GENERAL NOTICE TO CONTROL OR ERADICATE NOXIOUS WEEDS

Notice is hereby given this 12th day of May 2021, pursuant to Minnesota Statutes, Section 18.83, Subdivision 1 (2009), that all persons in Yellow Medicine County, Minnesota, shall control or eradicate all noxious weeds on land they occupy or are required to maintain. Control or eradication may be accomplished by any lawful method, but the method(s) applied may need to be repeated in order to prevent the spread of viable noxious weed seeds and other propagating parts to other lands. Failure to comply with the general notice may mean that an individual notice, Minnesota Statutes, Section 18.83, Subdivision 2 (2009), will be issued. An individual notice may be appealed within two working days of receipt to the appeal committee in the county where the land is located. Failure to comply with an individual notice will mean that the inspector having jurisdiction may either hire the work done or seek a misdemeanor charge against the person(s) who failed to comply. If the work is hired done by the inspector, the cost can be placed as a tax upon the land and collected as other real estate taxes are collected. You may obtain a list of the plants that are designated noxious and the members of the appeal committee from your County Agricultural Inspector or County-Designated Employee. You can also obtain this information from your Local Weed Inspectors. Local Weed Inspectors include the township supervisors, city mayors or their appointed assistants. More information regarding the MN Noxious Weed Law can be obtained from the Minnesota Department of Agriculture's Web Site by visiting: <http://www.mda.state.mn.us/weedcontrol>.

In addition to the statewide listed noxious weeds designated by the Minnesota Department of Agriculture, Bull Thistle (*Cirsium Vulgare*) and Musk Thistle (*Carduus nutans*) have been approved for listing on the County-Listed Noxious Weeds in Yellow Medicine County, by the Yellow Medicine County Board of Commissioners, as permitted by Minnesota Statutes 18.79, Subds. 13 and 14. Contact your county agricultural inspector for more information regarding County Noxious Weeds.

COMMUNITY INFORMATION

In order to assist with several of the most frequently asked questions regarding city ordinances, the Canby Police Department has compiled a short list of commonly requested information.

A complete list of city ordinances can be found at the Canby Public Library and Canby City Office.

Prohibited Parking (Ordinance #309.1)

The following vehicles are prohibited from parking on public streets or alleyways for longer than 72 hours –

RECREATIONAL VEHICLES

Include, but are not limited to: motor homes, campers, ATVs, boats, race cars, race car trailers and snowmobiles.

PROHIBITED VEHICLES

Construction trailers (unless being used in conjunction with an adjacent project), trailers and vehicles used to transport goods

SEMI-TRAILERS, TRUCK-TRACTOR COMBINATION, TRUCKS EXCEEDING 1 TON CAPACITY

Prohibited unless loading or unloading

Parking of vehicles longer than 72 hours is permissible by permit only. Permit applications may be found at Canby City Hall and the City of Canby's website.

Golf Carts / ATV (Ordinance #231.1)

No motorized golf cart shall be driven, operated, or controlled, on the roadways or shoulders under the jurisdiction of Canby unless the driver, operator, or person in control has in his or her actual physical possession a valid, current, and unrevoked permit of the City of Canby for driving, operation, or control of a motorized golf cart.

Permits may be issued to:

- Persons currently validly licensed to drive motor vehicles. No person whose license is revoked, suspended, or canceled may be issued an individual permit.
- Persons age 16 or older with no valid license for reasons other than revocation, suspension, or cancellation if competency and ability can be demonstrated

Permit applications may be found at Canby City Hall or on the City of Canby's website.

GOLF CART UNLAWFUL ACTS

No motorized golf cart shall be driven, operated, or controlled on the roadways or shoulders of roadways under the jurisdiction of the City of Canby:

- Between sunset and sunrise
- In inclement weather with visibility less than 500 ft
- Without a slow-moving vehicle placard
- Without a mirror
- Without liability insurance coverage
- Contrary to traffic laws and City Code
- Without a current valid Individual Permit

Both Golf Carts and ATVs may not be driven on State Highways or County Roads. All DNR rules apply to the safe operation of ATVs.

Public Nuisance (Ordinance #314)

THE FOLLOWING ITEMS ARE PROHIBITED

- Junk Vehicles, Junk or Rubbish, Deteriorating Structures
- Noxious Weeds and Other Uncontrolled Growths, Including Grass
- Trees, Hedges, Billboards, or Other Obstructions which prevent a person from having a clear view of all traffic approaching an intersection.

Sidewalks (Ordinance #109.3)

All snow, ice, dirt and rubbish must be removed within **24 hours** after deposit. The above-mentioned items, including grass, are also prohibited from being deposited on the street.

Animals (Ordinance #294.1)

THE FOLLOWING ACTS ARE PROHIBITED

- Dogs running at large
- Habitual barking
- Damage to property
- Failure to clean feces

A Kennel License is required for anyone who wishes to breed, whelp, raise, own, or harbor 3 or more dogs / 3 or more cats.
